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PART ONE

Introduction

Rural development is very important for the development of India. About 70 percent population of India still live in rural areas. Almost half of the workforce in the country is engaged in agriculture for their livelihood. Given such importance, it is necessary to promote rural development activities because rural areas of the country have a potential for employment opportunities. Besides, the rural areas have huge prospect and potentials in terms of resources, like human resources, land resources, water conservation, forest resources, etc.

The proper and sustainable development of these resources depend on our endeavor to enhance their capacity.

Keeping this in view the Triniketan Foundation for Development is planning to participate in the development process of Bhupnagar village, located in Distt. Jhansi, Uttar Pradesh.

To begin with, the foundation first conducted an orientation-cum-need sensing programme in the village on April 08, 2023. We believe that by harnessing our resources in our 6.5 lakh villages in India we can make our villages abode of peace, progress and growth.

The Programme was held in the Panchayati Bhawan located in village Bhupnagar, Jhansi, U.P.

Aim

The aim of the programme was to elicit ideas and opinions from the participant village residents regarding the development of their village.

Objectives

The specific objectives of the programme were the following:-

- To identify problems and opportunities for taking initiatives for development;
- To identify availability of human and material resources in the village;
- To measure the gap between existing resources and emerging requirements;
- To understand the extent of utilization of resources:
- To acquaint them with the ideas of building effective, organization, especially the Panchayati Raj Institution;
- To map resources in the village.

Participants



The programme was attended by 35 participants who were chosen by Shri Shiromoni Singh Rajput, the village Pradhan, a veteran trade union activist. The participants (see list) were from different age groups and educational levels. In addition, more than a dozen students from the village Junior High School also participated in the programme.

Inauguration

The programme was inaugurated by the Head Teacher, Ms. Arti. She highlighted the need to encourage the village people to work together to use the village resources effectively. She further said that because of interpersonal misunderstanding, quite



often village people fail to reap the benefit of working together. She emphasized that awareness training is much needed as it might change their behavior towards more co-operation among themselves. She thanked Dr. Anila Nair, chairperson of the Foundation. Another important event was the release of the "Triniketan News". It was released by Dr. Anila Nair and Mr. Shiromoni Singh Rajput. Mr. Shiromoni Singh Rajput, after the release of the Triniketan News, Mr Singh invited Dr. Anila Nair to address the participants.

Dr. Anila Nair, the Chairperson of the Triniketan Foundation for Development, welcomed the dignitaries and participants of the programme and spoke about the need for rural development and how important it is to work together to achieve the goal of sustainable

development for one and all. She briefly highlighted important constitutional functions of the Panchayat and how an effection implementation could transform the villages in India.

She also said the Foundation would continuously provide academic assistance to the activists who are involved in the village development activities. She further said that rural development is important and without development of agriculture, livestock, etc. it would be well-neigh impossible to achieve the goal of a viable India. She said that if all the stakeholders, like teachers, sarpanches, government



officials, academics, civil society, self-help groups, organizations, trade unions, mahila mondals and other organizations and interested individuals join hands together, then it would not be very far to realize our dream of a sustainable development of our villages.

After the Chairperson's talk, Mr. Rajput was invited to share his ideas and experiences as a village Pradhan. He described briefly about different issues regarding rural development and narrated how he has brought changes in the village.

He also shared his future plan for the development. Mr. Rajput, while describing the initiatives he has been taking since his being elected as a village Pradhan, pointed out that he has been receiving a lot of cooperation from his fellow villagers for the development of Bhupnagar. He also elaborated on the comprehensive functions on the Panchayate Raj Institution. He then invited participants to share their perception about different problems that are hindering the rapid development of the village. Mr. Rajput invited Mr. Bhagwandas Pehelwan, a veteran trade union leader to speak on the occasion.

Mr. Pehelwan thanked the organizers Mr. Rajput and Dr. Anila Nair for inviting him in the programme. He said that the initiative proposed to be taken to improve the conditions of the village is laudable. He urged upon the participants that with their help and cooperation Bhupnagar village can be made a model village. He also emphasized the need for unity among all sections of people for their development. After Mr. Pehelwan's speech, the school children, who were also present, were given a writing



pad and pen by the Foundation. After these events, discussion was initiated. The participants were requested to highlight and articulate problems and issues also suggest their solutions of problems. The following points emerged from the discussion and interactions.

Shortage of water

All the participants unanimously said that the most pressing problem in the area is the shortage of water for irrigation. Although the village periphery is connected by a canal, but supply of water is not very regular. As a result, during sowing and tending different crops become quite difficult.

The participants also said that more effort is required for water harvesting. They suggested that even the sewage water could be collected and treated for further use.



Sanitation & waste management

Another problem which the participants raised was the management of waste materials especially the left out feeds, cattle dungs and crop residue.

During our visit we, found that the village landscape is dotted with dung heaps. Due to congested residential habitation, dumping grounds for waste materials are shrinking, resulting in dumping of waste materials near houses/courtyards.

Education

A junior high school is located at southern part of the village. It is situated in a very beautiful place. However, the school compound needs to be spruced up. And this can be done by participation of students, their

Some, participants suggested that education system should be improved and technical skill training should be made available for youths. This would then find employment.

Uneven cultivable land

Another important problem, the participants pointed out, was the problem of uneven cultivable land. The land being uneven, the scope of retaining water becomes difficult. And levelling of land is very expensive. Although the government has a programme for levelling of land, but it is not universally implemented. Holdings which are below 5 acres, get the benefit of land levelling programme.

Concluding session

In the concluding session, the participants were given certificates for participation. The certificates were handed by Dr. Nair and Mr. Rajput. After the session of identifying problems, issues and their suggested solutions the Chairperson Dr. Anila Nair and Mr. S.S. Rajput proposed a vote of thanks. Dr. Nair said that she is extremely thankful to all the participants for their active participation in the discussion and also for their useful suggestion. She said that without the cooperation of Mr. Rajput it would not been possible to organize the programme.

After the vote of thanks, the participants were given light refreshments.

PART TWO

About Bhupnagar

"According to census 2011, the location code or village code of Bhupnagar village is 152840. Bhupnagar is located in Jhansi Tehsil of Jhansi District in Uttar Pradesh, India, It is situated 18



kms away from Jhansi, which is both district and sub-district headquarter of Bhupnagar village. As per 2009 stats, Bhupnagar is the gram panchayat of Bhupnagar village.

The total geographical area of the village is 300.6 hectares. Bhupnagar has a total population of 873 people. Out of which male population is 456 while female population is 417. Literacy rate of Bhupnagar village is 64.49% out of which 72.37% males and 55.88 females are literate.

There are about 180 houses in Bhupnagar village. Baragaon is the nearest town to Bhupnagar for all major economic activities, which approximately 3 kms away".



Village Infrastructure

Communication: The village is connected by a narrow road from the Jhansi-Kanpur highway and also from the block headquarter Baragaon. The road is not very much in good condition. It requires a top-up tar-mortar coating. The road serves as a lifeline of the village.

Irrigation

The village is connected by an irrigation canal from Baragaon and it meanders by the side of the village. Sometimes, it provides much needed water for cultivation. During the recent visit to the village we found some accumulated water in the canal. Like the roads, canal also requires

renovation.

Beside the canal, the cultivation of different crops also depends on power driven pump sets and many such pump sets could be seen in the agricultural field.

Village school

The village has a junior primary school. About students study in the school, the school is housed in a pucca building and protected by a broken boundary. It has a space which can be utilized for plantation of both timber and fruit trees.



Panchayat Bhavan

The village has a beautiful, neat and clean Panchayat Bhawan adjacent to the school. It is covered by a few neem and acacia trees which keep the compound cool and elegant.





Aanganwadi

Near the Panchayat Bhawan, the village Pradhan has recently constructed an Aanganwadi centre which is elegantly painted. The overall ambience is very clean.

Public Toilet

At a corner of the compound of the Panchayat Bhawan, there is also a public toilet constructed for the people who quite often attend meetings in the Panchayat Bhawan.

Drinking water

Bhupnagar is supplied with drinking water. However, there are also some hand pumps that also help the villagers to obtain water. Currently, the people in the village do not face any shortage of drinking water.

Crops grown in village Bhupnagar

In different seasons different crops are cultivated. However, the main crops that are cultivated are:

- Rabi Season. During Rabi Season, the main crops that are cultivated are: wheat, gram, peas, mustard and barley.
- Kharif Season. During Kharif season, the following crops are cultivated: penuts, pulse and sesame.
- Vegetable Cultivation. Apart from the above crops, some farmers also cultivate vegetables, like brinjal, bittergourd, tomato, bhindi etc.
- Trees and Plants. The village is covered by a variety of trees and plants. The tree species are: mango, pupil, sisham, neem, banyan, babul, black berry, guava, eucalyptus etc.

Livestock

People of Bhupnagar depend a great deal on livestock for their livelihood, apart from agriculture and non-agricultural activities during off-season. Almost every household keeps buffaloes, cows, goat and poultry. In fact, buffaloes are the major source of milk and income.
